The issues are:

- The lack of transparency by City and Council
- The lack of public consultation with the communities affected by low barrier wet houses
- The lack of study and consultation in the planning process
- Petitions to existing council have not been heard despite substantial community support and agreement
- The lack of communication on the subject from Mayor and Council
- The poor planning process from the City of Nanaimo

November 19 offers an opportunity to remove from office the existing councillors who have time and time again lied on the record, disputed fact from their own publications and refused to hear the voices of the people who voted them into office in the first place. Our sitting council seem to have forgotten who they work for and are 'yes men' for city officials. This is wrong and unethical.
